

Next Sunday (the last before Advent) is also the feast day of St Clement. He is thought to have been the fourth successor to Peter as Pope. He died in the 4th Century by being thrown out to sea weighed to an anchor. The church of St Clement's Dane in Fleet Street is dedicated to him and the bells of the church are immortalised in the children's song, 'Oranges and Lemons'. He is also the Patron Saint of blacksmiths.

Island Pilgrimage – the first 100 days

This afternoon Jo and Jamie Hay will give a short talk about some of their experiences as they sailed the first 100 days of their 'Island Pilgrimage' Round Britain Prayer Sail and the work of the Morning Star Trust, which they are supporting.
