Today is All Souls' Day – when we remember and pray for all the dead, especially loved ones. In 1048, Odilo, the Abbot of the Benedictine Monastery at Cluny near Paris, instructed the monks to hold 2 November as a day of remembrance and prayer for 'all the departed'. The day was made an official feast day of the Western church in the fourteenth century. The customs developed differently in the Eastern Church where remembrances were on three separate days is the period before Lent.

The week also brings Guy Fawkes' Day on Wednesday. A day to commemorate the failure of the plot in 1605 by Guido Fawkes, Robert Gatesby, Thomas Winter and others to blow up King James I and his parliament. Expect lots of fireworks displays and bonfires around and about.
